STAFF PRESENTATIONS / COMMENTS

Corporate Challenge Award Presentation

Director Jonathan Marshall introduced Community Services Manager Ted Bistarkey, from the City of Chino, accompanied by Community Services Director, Dr. Linda Reich, and Community Services Supervisor Nikki Hendricks, who presented an award to the City. Community Service Coordinator Jesse Cortez, and City Manager Ben Montgomery accepted the award, for coming out victorious against the City of Chino in the Corporate Challenge events.

Chair Holtkamp thanked the City of Chino staff for their attendance and their presentation of the award.

Proposed Capital Improvement Program Budget for FY 2022-23

Engineering Manager Carl Hassel presented on the Fiscal Year 2022 – 23 Proposed Capital Improvement Program Budget.

Commissioner James-Perez questioned the Los Serranos Safe Routes to School Project, and how much of the Los Serranos neighborhood will remain without sidewalks. Mr. Hassel responded there is a large portion of the community that will remain without sidewalks, and he clarified that this project created sidewalk pathways on the South side of the streets, on Gird Avenue, Lugo Avenue, and El Molino Boulevard from Del Norte Avenue to Valle Vista Drive. Commissioner James-Perez also questioned if the project on Eucalyptus Avenue will create sidewalk pathways as well, and if the funding is separate from the Capital Improvement Program Budget. Mr. Hassel confirmed this to be true and added the project she is referring to was intended to improve the storm drains

along the street, however the budget allowed for sidewalks to be added to cover the repairs made.

Commissioner James-Perez questioned if the percentage of Parks and Open Space funding, includes the Community Park renovation project. Mr. Hassel confirmed it does.

Director Marshall commented on the Community Park improvements.

Chair Holtkamp questioned when phase one of the renovation would begin. Director Marshall responded construction would begin November 6, 2022. She requested clarification for the Vellano Park upgrades. Mr. O'Connor mentioned that he understands most of the high cost to be a result of adding running power from the main line to the lighting fixtures.

Commissioner Jackson questioned the Chino Avenue pavement rehab project. He asked if there was an ongoing issue with the construction of the road. Mr. Hassel clarified this project section was further east of the past construction Commissioner Jackson is referring to. Commissioner Jackson questioned if a waste transfer station is included in the project, as he noticed a lot of bins near English Springs Park. Mr. Hassel stated the waste transfer station is not included in this year's budget. Commissioner Jackson questioned the projected start date for the Rock Springs Pavement Rehab project, and Mr. Hassel stated that staff hopes to take the project to Council for approval in September and begin the project in October.

Chair Holtkamp asked if the Hope for the Hills parking lot is included in the coming years improvement projects. Maintenance and Operations Manager Sean O'Connor responded that the bid will open in the coming week and the project will be completed by the end of summer. Chair Holtkamp asked for clarification about Vila Borba Park renovations, and Mr. O'Connor clarified that work at Vila Borba is the annual sod replacement. Chair Holtkamp questioned the pedestrian light modification on Boy's Republic Drive from St. Paul the Apostle Catholic Church to City Hall, and Mr. Hassel responded that the crosswalk would be changed to include a HAWK signal, which includes a red light that will stop traffic when pedestrians would like to cross, instead of the current yield light. He also mentioned that a diagonal crosswalk would be installed.

Update of Community Services Monthly Calendar

Supervisor Melissa Armit presented the Community Services monthly calendar, assisted by Supervisor Michael Adams.

Chair Holtkamp questioned the return of the Adult Soccer on Thursdays. Supervisor Adams responded that staff planned on the return of Thursday nights, however enrollment

for the program has been extremely low. Therefore, staff are working to replace the programming with a 40+ Women's League.

Update on Community Services and Parks Projects

Director Marshall informed the Commission on the updates for the Crossroads Park renovation project and stated the project will return for discussion at the next meeting. Commissioner Jackson requested clarification on the signage for the park, and Director Marshall informed him it does not reflect on the diagram commissioners were given, however it will be at the front of the park. Director Marshall also mentioned that the Bike Repair Project remains set to be installed in August, after weed abatement is completed. He lastly updated the Commission on the Torrey Pines Park upgrades, commenting he is waiting for the cost estimate from the architect to move forward.

Supervisor Armit updated the Commission that the panels for the Military Monument contained some incorrect engraving, therefore the monument has been guarded to prevent moisture while the engraving is corrected, and the project should be finalized in the coming weeks.

Director Marshall provided an update on the Splash Pad and community building, and stated staff are working with County Supervisor Curt Hagman's office to secure additional funding needed to complete the entire project. He also discussed the Skate Park updates and informed the Commission that Supervisor Hagman pledged \$125,000 towards the project renovations, which is half of the total cost. He added staff are waiting on the proposal from New Line Skate Parks, Inc. He updated the Commission on the Mystic Canyon building, regarding the HVAC system, which was approved to be upgraded, along with new paint, that will allow programming to return in January 2023. He updated on the Teen Advisory Committee and stated that staff are preparing an Action Plan and Timeline, and additional updates will be provided in August. Director Marshall concluded by stating Supervisor Adams is currently working on projects that are funded by ARPA money, including the Show Wagon vehicle, which will take 9 months to be completely outfitted, and the Mobile Recreation Vehicle. He added the Mobile Recreation Vehicle received funding from the Chino Hills Community Foundation, Supervisor Hagman's office, and ARPA money, to completely pay for the project.

Commissioner James-Perez questioned how the trees that were planted at the Arbor Day celebration are thriving. Mr. O'Connor responded they seem to be growing well, mostly, though a few were lost, as typically happens during new planting.

Mr. O'Connor updated the Commission that the Butterfield Park fencing project was sent out for an RFP, for the company to replace the fencing that was melted during a fire at the park. He stated the materials are on order and the fencing will be replaced by mid-august. He added various parking lot updates, are out to bid and will be finalized in the coming weeks. He mentioned Danbury Park restrooms have been painted, as well as the wooden rafter tails, which were deteriorated, have been replaced. He informed the Commission Hope for the Hills Park's restrooms received new exterior paint.

Commissioner Jackson requested a committee charge, a mission and goals, for the Teen Advisory Committee.

Vice Chair Gavela asked if the additional design for the Skate Park has any visuals. Director Marshall responded that he will present on the project at the next meeting, and there will be a workshop to take place before the project is finalized.

Chair Holtkamp questioned how the Torrey Pines upgrades will take place with the architect. Director Marshall stated that the enhancement ideas will be presented to the architect, then staff can decide what enhancements can occur based on the available budget.

COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

Commissioner James-Perez thanked staff for the reports. She congratulated Team Chino Hills for their win on the corporate challenge award. She thanked Mr. O'Connor and the City Manager, as well as staff from Diamond Bar and City of Industry, for the Tres Hermanos tour. She questioned if the community center is considered a cooling center. Supervisor Armit responded that it is not officially a cooling center, though anyone is welcome, but the Chino Hills James S. Thalman Library, which is nearby, serves as an official cooling center.

Commissioner Jackson congratulated Team Chino Hills for the rubber chicken award. He thanked Mr. Hassel for presenting the CIP budget presentations. He thanked staff for their presentations and work. He acknowledged Chair Holtkamp and Student Member Nicole Torres for their leadership regarding the Teen Advisory Committee. He questioned the ability to have classic cars for display at the Farmers Market, which takes place every Wednesday at The Shoppes. He highly emphasized the need for a committee charge, mission and goals for the Teen Advisory Committee.

Vice Chair Gavela thanked staff for their reports.

Chair Holtkamp mentioned receiving a comment from a resident suggesting reflective paint for handicap spaces. Mr. Hassel mentioned that there are reflective markers and the sign itself is reflective, so drivers know where to park. She thanked staff for their presentations. She mentioned viewing the trails map in the recreation downstairs office, and requested that image to be added to the website. She also suggested her fellow commissioners view the new art boxes added to the city. She commended the progress made on the Teen Advisory Committee, highlighting our Student Member Torres for all her work. She requested a more aggressive marketing strategy for adult soccer. Director Marshall responded that lack of participation can be a challenge all adult sports face. He mentioned men's leagues are extremely popular and the women's leagues often suffer lower enrollment.

Chair Holtkamp adjourned the meeting at 8:18 p.m. to the next regular Parks and Recreation Commission Meeting on Wednesday, August 17, 2022.

RECOMMENDATION:

1. Approve the Teen Advisory Board Strategic Action Plan.
2. Approve the formation of a Teen Advisory Board Ad Hoc Committee.
3. Appoint Parks and Recreation Commissioners to serve on the Teen Advisory Board Ad Hoc Committee.

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS:

At the July 12, 2022, City Council meeting, Council provided direction to move forward with the formation of a Teen Advisory Board. The Teen Advisory Board will serve in an advisory capacity to the Parks and Recreation Commission. A Teen Advisory Board Strategic Action Plan (Action Plan) and timeline, regarding the formation of the Teen Advisory Board is attached (Attachment A). Proposed in the Action Plan is the creation of a Teen Advisory Board Ad Hoc Committee, to assist with the development of the Teen Advisory Board Policy. Staff is recommending that the Teen Advisory Ad Hoc Committee include one or two Park and Recreation Commission member(s), the current Parks and Recreation Student Member, and students that have participated in the preliminary research process. The Ad Hoc Committee will expire after the Teen Advisory Board Policy has been approved by City Council. The estimated completion is February 2023.

At this meeting we are looking for the Parks and Recreation Commission's approval of the Action Plan. If the Commission approves the Action Plan, then approval of the Ad Hoc Committee is necessary, along with appointment of one or two commissioners to serve on the Ad Hoc Committee. Attached for the commissioners' reference is the Survey of Teen Advisory Boards/Councils (Attachment B) from six surrounding cities, that was presented to City Council.

SUBJECT: CROSSROADS PARK INCLUSIVE PLAYGROUND PROJECT

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve Proposed Design for Crossroads Park Inclusive Playground Project

BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS:

Over the past several months, staff have provided updates to the Parks and Recreation Commission regarding the replacement of the existing playground at Crossroads Park. The existing playground will be replaced with an "inclusive" playground, which would be the first of its kind among the 31 playgrounds throughout the City's 44 park system. The playground (Attachments 1-4) will feature a wide range of components, including 17 elevated play components. Of those 17 components, 11 are accessible via ramps; including 3 ramp-transfer stations. Additional features include 11 memory-sensory related elements and ADA compliant surfacing. The current playground does not contain a swing set, and there are no plans to install one at this time, as the playground area lacks adequate space.

In addition to the playground, Crossroads Park will undergo further upgrades as shown in Attachment 4. The parking lot will be increased by 9 parking spaces and accessible fitness equipment will be added, adjacent to the playground. Moreover, all picnic areas will be accessible with increased bench seating throughout.

Note: Currently existing at 6 of 31 playgrounds are adaptive swings, which are very popular, however no current playground has provided an inclusive experience for children with special needs.

Additional outreach was conducted for the project that included emailing 32 past special needs class participants, flyers (Attachment 5) sent to youth enrolled in special education programs at Chino Hills Schools, and a display assembled at the Community Center, during a hosted workshop event dedicated to children with disabilities. The workshop was hosted by a Girl Scout working on her Girl Scout Gold Award Project. Responses by anyone will be provided to the Commission at the meeting.

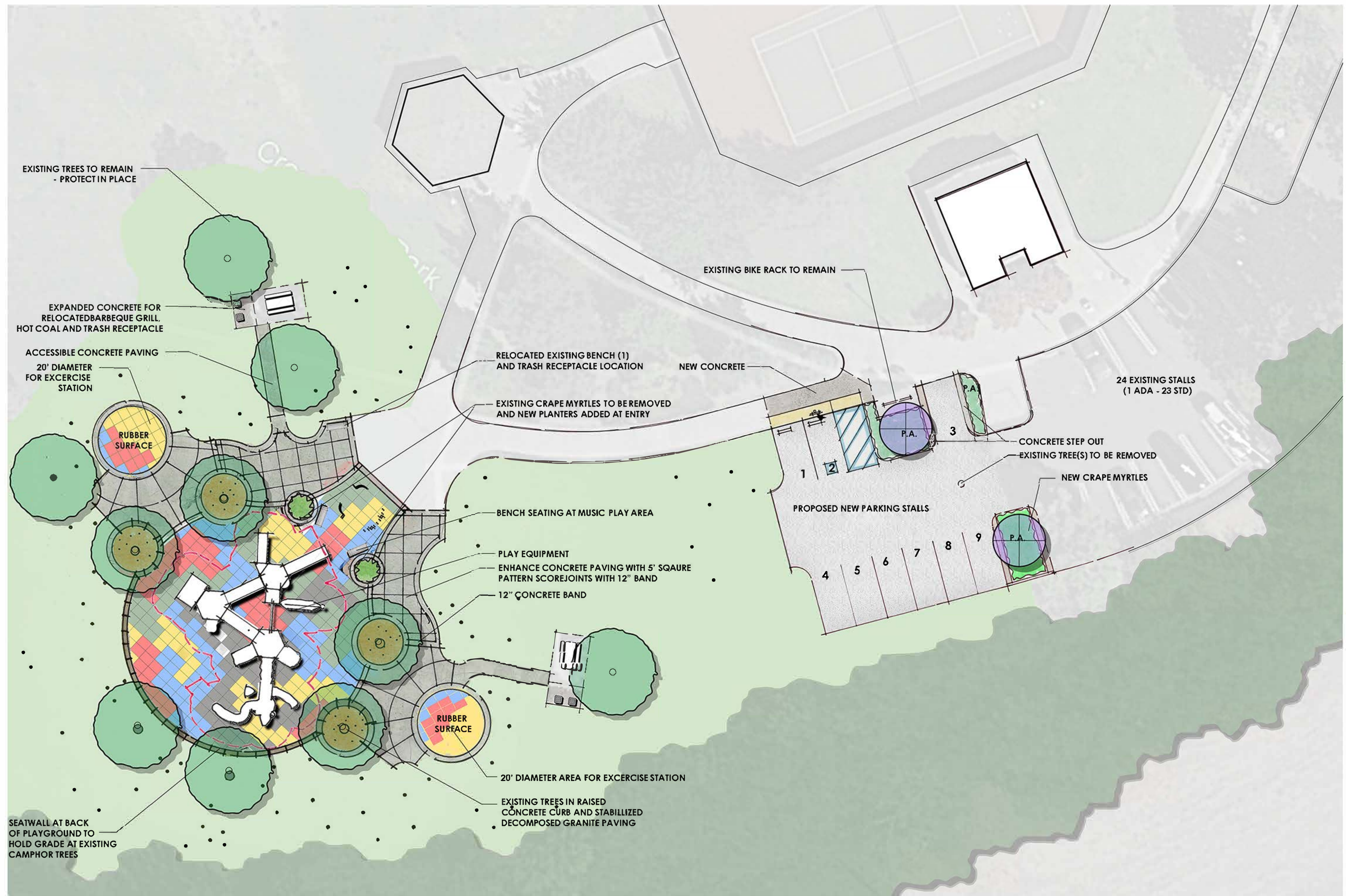

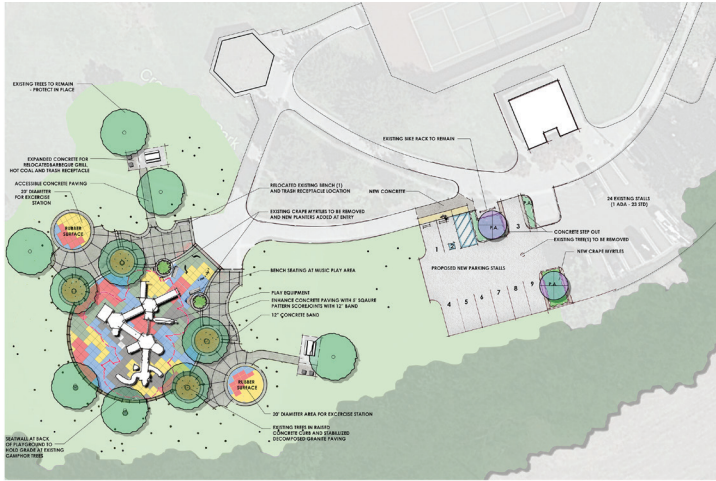

Dear Parent/Guardian,

The City of Chino Hills is replacing the existing playground at Crossroads Park, 2765 Chino Hills Parkway with an inclusive playground. The City is very excited to include this first of its kind playground in its inventory of 31 playgrounds already existing throughout the City's 44 park system.

The playground will feature a wide range of components including 17 elevated play components. Eleven of the 17 components are accessible by ramps including three ramp transfer stations. Eleven of the components are memory sensory related components as well. The playground surfacing will be ADA compliant. There are not plans to provide swings at this playground as there is not room to do so.

Several other upgrades to Crossroads Park will be occurring as well. The parking lot will be increased by nine parking spaces. Accessible fitness equipment will also be included adjacent to the playground and all picnic areas will be accessible as well with extra bench seating throughout.
