This document is the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP) for the City of Chino Hills 2021-2029 6<sup>th</sup> Cycle Housing Element. The purpose of the MMRP is to ensure that the required mitigation measure identified in the Initial Study / Mitigated Negative Declaration (ISMND) is implemented as part of the overall project implementation.

The following table summarizes the mitigation measure for the issue area identified in the ISMND for the project, Tribal Cultural Resources. The table identifies the mitigation measure; the action required for the measure to be implemented; the time at which the monitoring is to occur; the monitoring frequency; and the agency or party responsible for ensuring that the monitoring is performed. In addition, the table includes columns for compliance verification. These columns will be filled out by the City Community Development Department to document monitoring compliance. No other areas of impact requiring mitigation were identified in the ISMND.
